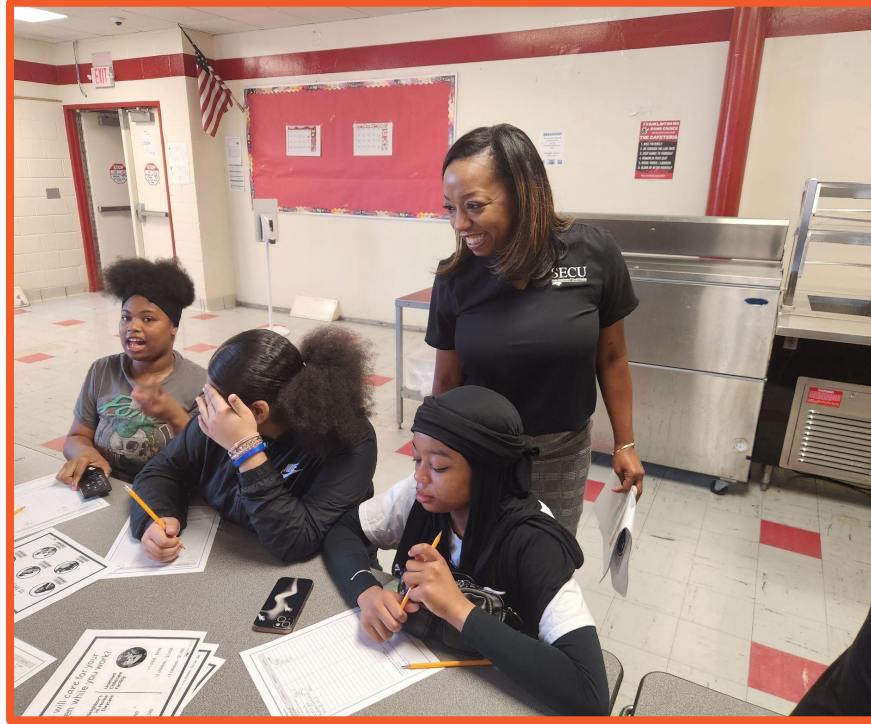

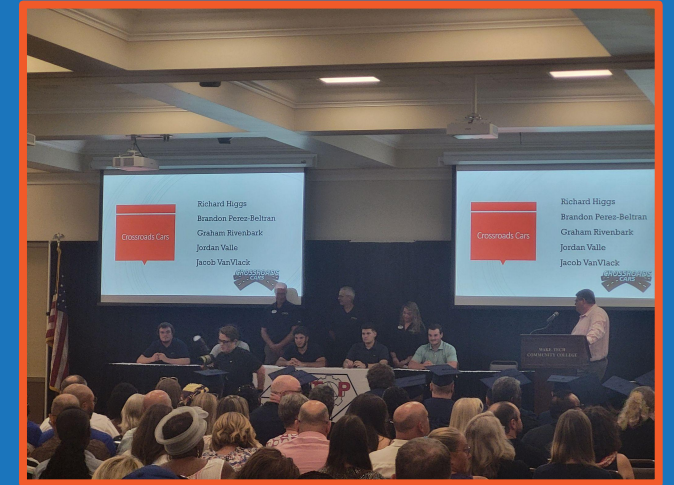
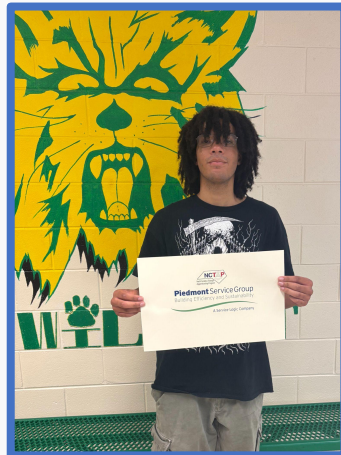


CTE In Action

Work Based Learning- NCTAP Apprenticeships

[NCTAP](#) is an apprenticeship program designed to develop experts needed in the modern workforce. The core training program utilizes a hands-on approach to develop skills across a wide range of disciplines in manufacturing. In August, three FHS students completed the NCTAP summer pre-apprenticeship program and were selected for the NCTAP 4-year apprenticeship program. These students participated in a signing ceremony at Wake Tech.

In November, NCTAP interest sessions were held at each high school and 58 students met with an NCTAP representatives. *For 2024-2025 school year, 3 students (below) were selected for the NCTAP summer pre-apprenticeship program from FHS (Joseph Houck, 11th with Morris for Welding), BHS (Alijah Clifton, 12th with Piedmont for HVAC), and LMHS (Kane King, 12th with Siemens for Mechatronics/Engineering).*

Three students from ECHS, and FHS were hired by an electronics manufacturing company, Trimm, in Youngsville. 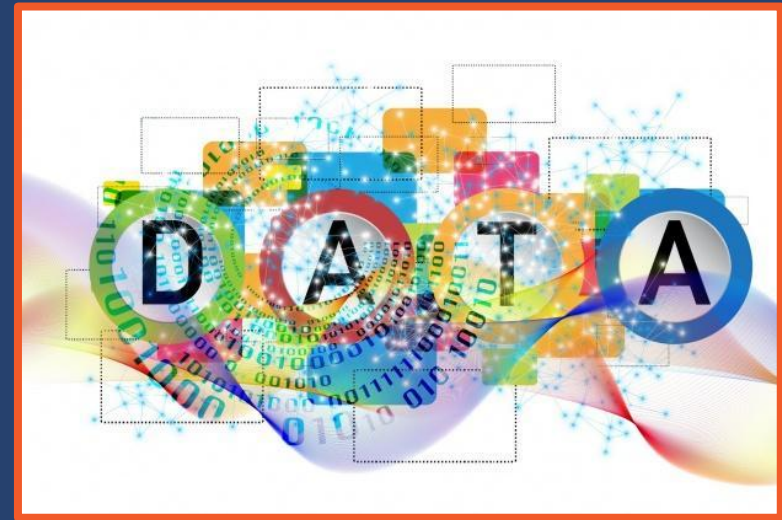
Culinary students received an exclusive behind the scenes tour of the hotel's kitchen, while all students were treated to a guided tour of the hotel's elegant facilities.

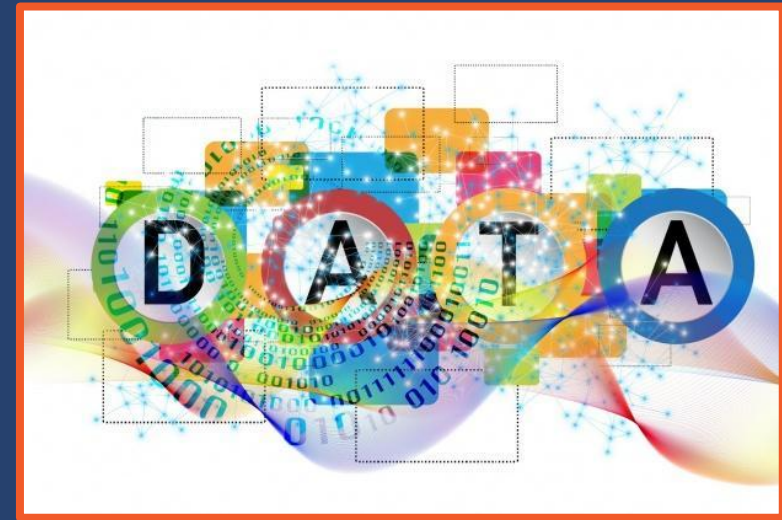

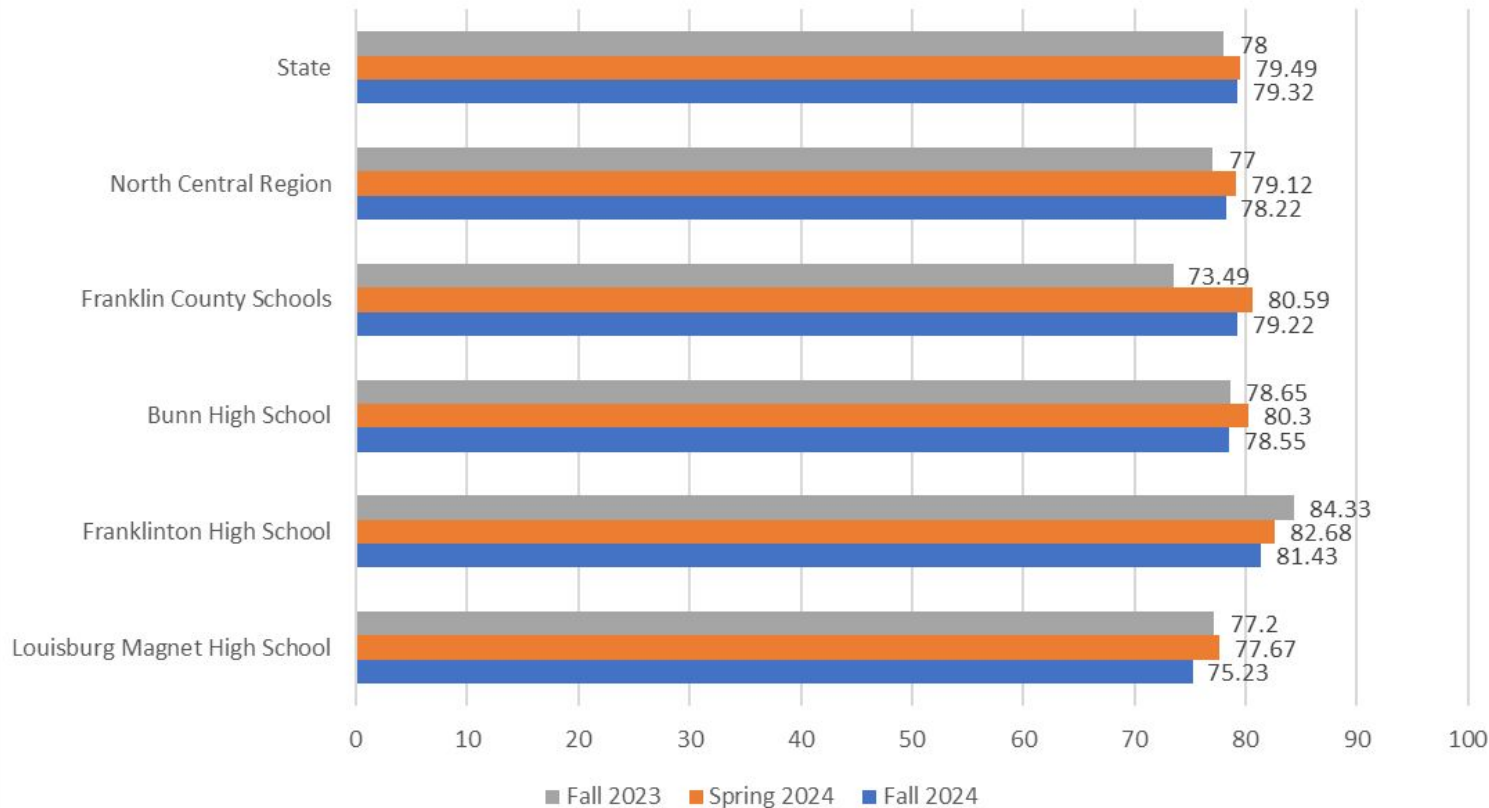
CTE Data 2023-2024

- **Above 95%**-Four-Year Graduation Rate for CTE Concentrators
- **Above 95%**-Post-Secondary Placement of CTE Concentrators in advanced training, military service, national or community service, Peace Corps, employment, or Postsecondary Education was above 95%
- **70.10%**-CTE concentrators earned a recognized postsecondary credential aligned with their concentrator pathway
- **73.64%**-CTE participants in grades 9-13 who met proficiency on the Proof of Learning (Performance Based Measure & CTE State Assessment)



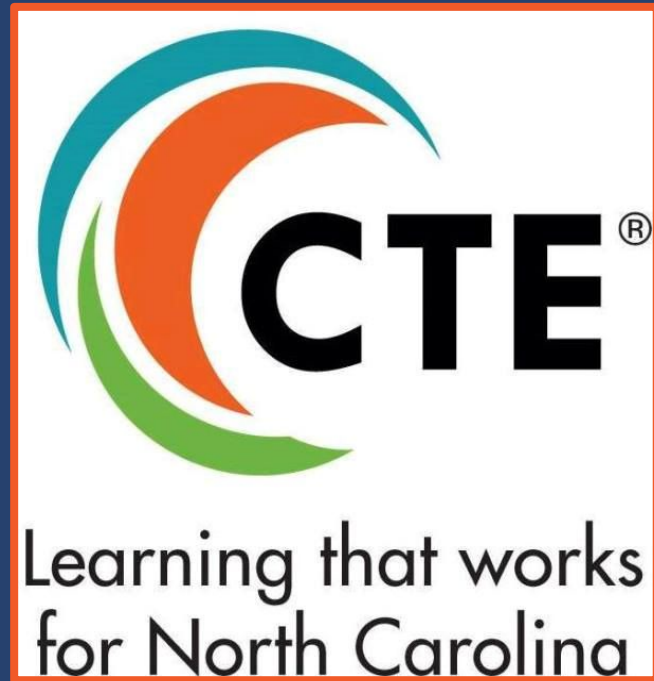

Franklin County CTE Proficiency Report



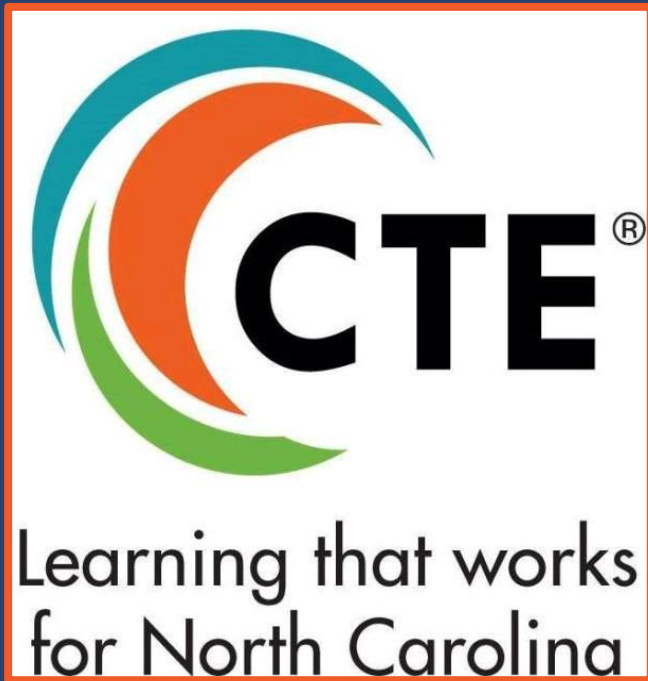
This chart represents Franklin County Schools performance on the NC CTE State Assessment and Performance Based Measures.





CTE Credential Data

Franklin County Schools earned **3,469** in 2023-2024. The credential potential was **6,715** and the credential rate was **51.5** %.

✓ **PRC 013 Allotment** - 420 Months of Employment (Dollar: \$3,261,720.00)

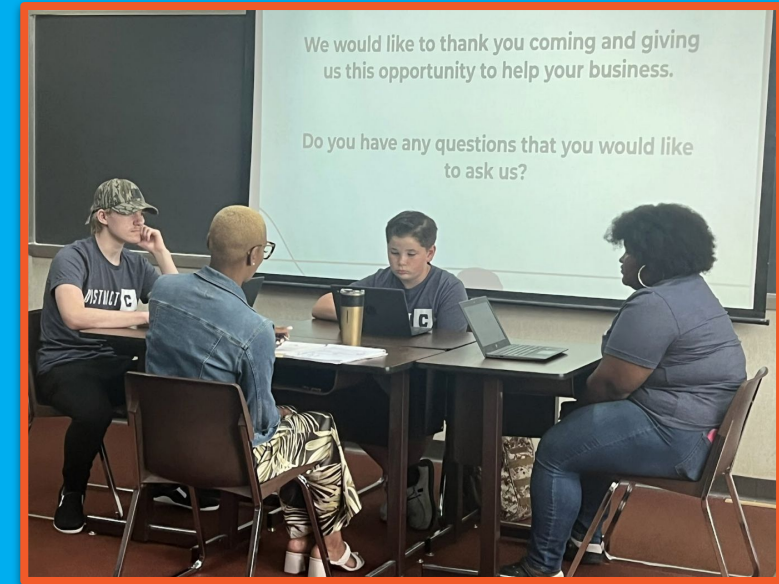
State months of employment may be used in grades 6-12 for employing non-administrative personnel in a local school administrative unit to satisfy one or more of the following purposes. *A Month of Employment (MOE) is a unit of employment corresponding to a calendar month.*

✓ **PRC 014 Allotment** - \$141,954

The purpose of these funds is to provide support for CTE program services and activities. These funds shall be used for instructional salaries, instructional support, and clerical personnel assisting LEAs in the expansion, improvement, modernization and development of quality CTE programs in grades 6-12. (General Statute 115C-156) In addition, PRC 014 funds may be used for career awareness activities to encourage 5th grade students to explore career pathways and prepare students for the transition to middle school career planning. (General Statute 115C-152) Allocations are made based on a formula, which provides a \$10,000 base amount to each LEA. The remainder of the available funds is allotted based on ADM in grades 8-12.

✓ **PRC 017 Allotment** - Not allotted yet. Last Year: \$175,765

The purpose of the Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act (Perkins V) is to develop more fully the academic knowledge and technical and employability skills of secondary education students and postsecondary education students who elect to enroll in Career and Technical Education programs and programs of study. The emphasis should be on the development, coordination, implementation, or improvement of CTE programs. PRC 017 fund can be used for CTE students in grades 5-12 and postsecondary students. Allocations will be made to LEAs based on a formula, which includes the following factors: 1) 70% shall be allotted based upon the proportion of children in poverty ages 5-17 from the preceding fiscal year. 2) 30% shall be allotted based upon the proportion of children ages 5-17 from the preceding fiscal year.

2025-2026 Ongoing Budget Priorities

- Program improvement to align with NCDPI equipment expectations and industry standards
- Continue to increase involvement of business partners
- Increase student participation in Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO)
- Provide work based learning opportunities--field trips, internships, pre-apprenticeships, etc.
- Support professional development for teachers such as CTE Summer Conference
- Fund participation in regional, state, and national CTSO conferences as allowable
- Continue funding 25% of the Administrative Assistant Position that supports the CTE Director and the Executive Director of Federal Programs and Elementary Education
- Continue to fund 75% Career Development Coordinator position to support Career Development Continuum activities including but not limited to supporting job shadowing, internships, apprenticeship programs, providing credential support, etc.
- Instructional supplies and materials including those purchased with open purchase orders that support courses/programs such as: Culinary Arts, Foods and Nutrition, Carpentry, Masonry, Agriculture, District C, and Career Camps
- Xello Career Readiness Program for students in grades 5-12 Approximately: \$25,000
- Renewal of various software and subscription programs for ALL high schools such as: iCEV (Ag. Programs and Automotive), Identifix Electronic Service Manual (Automotive), Adobe Suite (Adobe), etc.
